Answer

In rave culture, the Roland TB-303, TR-808, and TR-909 are iconic machines that shaped electronic music, particularly acid house, techno, and house. Their model numbers—303, 808, and 909—are legendary in the scene.

Roland TB-303 Bass Line (1981)

A bass synthesizer, not a drum machine, known for its squelchy, resonant sound. Initially a flop, it was rediscovered by Chicago house producers, defining acid house with tracks like Phuture's "Acid Tracks" (1987). Its sliding basslines are a rave staple.

Roland TR-808 Rhythm Composer (1980)

An analog drum machine with a booming kick, sharp snares, and crisp claps. Its warm, punchy sounds fueled hip-hop, electro, house, and techno, making it a cornerstone of rave rhythms.

Roland TR-909 Rhythm Composer (1983)

A hybrid analog-digital drum machine with a punchy kick and crisp hi-hats. It became the go-to for techno and house, driving the relentless beats of 1990s raves.

Which Was First?

The **TR-808** (1980) came first, followed by the **TB-303** (1981) and **TR-909** (1983).

Which Is Most Famous?

The **TR-808** is the most famous due to its universal influence across hip-hop, pop, trap, and rave music. Its kick and clap are iconic, referenced in songs and slang. In rave culture, the **TB-303** is huge for acid house, and the **TR-909** is key for techno, but the 808's broad impact makes it the most recognized.

These numbers symbolize the DIY spirit of rave culture, with each machine's unique sound shaping subgenres and inspiring countless tracks.
